About the workshop

Dependency courts are *systems*. The structure of a system as well as the way the parts of that system interact matter. These two factors have a great impact on the outcomes generated by the system. This workshop will help those working in dependency court systems to think about what ethical behavior is, whether implicit conflicts in the ethical frameworks of those working in the dependency system exist, and ways of improving both outcomes for families and our own daily work environment.

Tim Jaasko-Fisher is Director of the Court Improvement Training Academy (CITA) at the University of Washington, School of Law's Child and Youth Advocacy Clinic. Prior to becoming the director of CITA in September 2007, Tim was an Assistant Attorney General for 11 years. He represented the Washington State Department of Social and Health Services Children's Administration. He was awarded his Bachelor of Arts in Government from New Mexico State University in 1993, his Juris Doctorate from Seattle University School of Law in 1996 and a Master of Arts degree from Seattle University's Organization Systems Renewal program in 2011.
